

## Each New Year Is A New Opportunity To Serve God

On the Christian Calendar, the first or second Sunday in January (usually the second) is always "Baptism of the Lord" Sunday.

The prophecies and expectation of a coming Messiah are the theme of Advent, and all the stories about the birth of Jesus are the theme of Christmas. With the Baptism of Jesus, the Church Calendar begins to look at the earthly ministry of Jesus, because the first thing Jesus did when he began his earthly ministry was to be baptized by John the Baptist.

The Baptism of the Lord marked a new beginning in the life of Jesus. He was no longer an anonymous carpenter, the son of Mary and Joseph; he was now the Messiah, the Christ, actively preaching, teaching, healing, and fully revealing God and God's love for all people. He began to engage actively in his appointed ministry as the perfect servant of God.

Because the Baptism of the Lord is always in early January, that means that every January we have the opportunity to re-commit ourselves to Christian service, doing those things that God calls us to do.

On our normal, earthly calendar, New Year's is a time when many of us make resolutions, resolving to

do the good we have failed to do, and to stop the bad things we have been doing. We try to be better people.

On the Church Calendar, the Baptism of Jesus is similar. It is a time for each one of us, too, to set out on our own ministry of service and obedience to God.

Of course, Jesus knew what his mission was. As the Son of God, he was "Immanuel," or "God with us." Because he was fully human as well as fully God, he was God experiencing all the ups and downs, joys and sorrows, and achievements and disappointments of the human condition – yet without sinning. Through his perfect life, he showed complete obedience to God, and he became the perfect sacrifice when God's life was given on the cross as the payment for our sins.

None of us is called to die for humanity's sins, but we *are* called to die to self, and to die to sinning. As Christians, we die to self by living first and foremost for God; and we die to sin by turning away from sin, and turning to a life of obedience to God through obeying the commandments of our Lord and Savior Jesus.

Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 12:7 that each of us has been given a spiritual gift for the common good. It is our ministry to find that special gift, and to put it use to the service and glorification of God.

# Minutes For Regular Session Meeting Held Nov. 19

The Session of Hebron Presbyterian Church held its stated monthly meeting on Thursday, Nov. 18, at 7:00 p.m. Minutes of the meeting were approved at the Dec. 16 Session meeting and are printed here:

Frank Wyche; Treasurer Michael Ruleman; Elders-elect David Obenschain, Jim McGavock. Excused: Elders Jeff Simmons, Jon Arneson, Lora Turnage, Tom Cook. Absent: Elder Glenn Mader.

A quorum being present, the Moderator opened the meeting at 7:05 p.m. with prayer. For a devotional, the Moderator stressed that our joint ministry is about Christ, and how to best remain focused on God and not just what we see individually.

Clerk's Report: Session approved the minutes of the October 21, 2010, Stated Session Meeting as presented.

Session approved a request for transfer from Brocky A. Nicely and Arlene Nicely to Mt. Vernon Church of the Brethren, Waynesboro, Va., and instructed the Clerk to issue a certificate of transfer. The Clerk presented the report from the Committee on Ministry visit to Hebron. Copies will be made available to Session members. The Clerk presented a letter from the Shenandoah Presbytery History Committee containing a brief sketch of Hebron history. No changes to the history were suggested, therefore no reply is needed.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Michael Ruleman distributed a report of fund balances as of Nov. 18, 2010, and a report of receipts and disbursements since the last meeting. For the month, the church received income of \$1,501.74 above expenses. The General Fund currently shows a (-\$768.49) negative balance. The report was approved as presented.

Presbytery Report: Pastor Frank Wyche and Elder-Commissioner Hannah Bush distributed and reviewed the highlights of the Nov. 9, 2010, Stated Meeting of Shenandoah Presbytery. They also distributed and discussed the proposed amendments to the Constitution of PCUSA which were voted on during the meeting.

Old Business: None.

## Committee Reports

Cemetery (Alan Mayer, Jan Botkin): Co-chair Alan Mayer reported on locating and marking the in-ground grave site indicators in section 7 and 8 of the new cemetery.

Christian Education (Lora Turnage, Hannah Bush): Thanks were given to all (especially Brenda Smiley, Doris Riley, Robin Ruleman and Doug Riley) who helped make the Hebron Harvest Festival of Nov. 13, 2010, a big success. The committee has sent a draft



proposal for the Scott Hickey Memorial Fund to the Hickey family and awaits a reply. A reminder was made about the Christmas Fellowship Dinner, sponsored by the Sunday School Department, on Saturday, Dec. 11, 2010, at 6:00 p.m. Session approved a committee recommendation for Confirmation Class to be held Jan. 9, 2011, through April 10, 2011, led by Pastor Wyche.

Commitment/Witness (Martha Sieck): Chair Martha Sieck distributed a report of committee activities, including the Crop Walk, Peacemaking Offering, Children's Thanksgiving Offering, Christmas Joy Offering, Heifer International, Operation Christmas Child, and SACRA. Session approved committee recommendations for the Scouts: to use the Fellowship Hall and kitchen on January 23, 2011, for a spaghetti dinner (inclement weather date is Jan. 30); to use the Fellowship Hall and kitchen on Feb. 4-5 for the Cub Scouts Pinewood Derby; and to observe Boy Scout Sunday on the Feb. 6, 2011, with the Rev. Charles Carpenter invited to participate in the worship service, and with all the day's loose offering go to the Scouts (half to the Boy Scout Troop and half to the Cub Scout Pack).

Congregational Ministries (Fred Smiley, Jon Arneson, Glenn Mader): Chair Fred Smiley reported that the new music CD by our choir is complete and is being distributed to the home-bound.

Fellowship/Service (Joan Wright): No report.

Personnel (Jeff Simmons, Tom Cook, Theresa Moore): Session approved a committee recommendation to adopt the Church and Family and Medical Leave Policy and Practice for Hebron. This document will be included in the Hebron Personnel Manual.

Property (Glenn Mader, Tom Cook, Fred Smiley): Leaf cleanup day is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 20, 2010. The committee members discussed the status of the furnace improvements currently under way.

Stewardship/Finance (Larry Mayer, Theresa Moore, Frank Henderson): A copy of the proposed 2011 budget was distributed to Session members with instructions to

read it and be prepared to discuss and vote on it at the December Stated Session Meeting. Hannah Bush reported that she will have the Financial Review completed and a report of findings delivered to Session by the end of the year. A document was presented showing that Hebron's Insurance Policy includes coverage for theft of money and securities (limit \$3,500) and a blanket bond (limit \$50,000). Coverages can be increased or a separate surety bond purchased at additional cost.

Worship (Jan Botkin, Hannah Bush, Lorrie Dean): The sanctuary will be decorated by Nov. 21, 2010. The Chrismon Tree will be put up on December 1, 2010. New Organist Ben Heizer will meet with the choir on Dec. 1, 2010. Session approved a committee recommendation to ordain/install officers on January 9, 2011, and to move the previously scheduled Communion from Jan. 2 to Jan. 16, 2011. Thanks were given to all (especially Joan Wright, Gail Mayer, the Choir, and the Worship Committee) for their help with the Luis González piano recital and reception of Nov. 14, 2010.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Frank Wyche will be the

speaker at the Community Thanksgiving Service on Nov. 24, 2010, at Smokey Row Baptist Church. The Pastor continues to serve as moderator of the Buffalo Gap and Craigsville churches at the request of Shenandoah Presbytery while these churches are without a pastor. A new round of Home Communion will begin Nov. 30, 2010, after celebration of the Lord's Supper on Sunday, Nov. 21, 2010. The pastor will lead a confirmation class beginning on Jan. 9, 2011, and concluding with participants joining the church on Palm Sunday. The church office will be closed on November 25 and 26 for Thanksgiving.

New Business: Officer training will be scheduled in time for officers-elect to be examined at the December Stated Session Meeting before they are ordained/installed January 9, 2011.

## Hebron's Scouts Are Active, But Could Use Your Help

The Summer and Fall of 2010 were busy times for the Boy Scout Troop 122 and Cub Scout Pack 122, both sponsored by Hebron Presbyterian Church. We have 8 boys in the Troop who were not active on Jan. 1, 2010, and we have 35 boys in the Pack.

The Pack has had activities every month from June through August. September was Popcorn Kickoff, Recruiting Night at Beverly Manor Elementary, and a Pack Campout.

The Troop went to Camp Shenandoah in July, and a Campout near Augusta Springs on some private property in September. The boys have organized into the Bison Patrol and are working on their Tenderfoot Rank since most of them have completed the Boy Scout Rank. They participated in a Flag Retirement Ceremony on Nov. 11 at the Scout Hut and planned a covered dish dinner on Nov. 23 in the Fellowship Hall.

I continue to go to these events, as well as attending Valley District and Roundtable meetings. However, I find very few other Chartered Organization Representatives at District meetings.

The Troop and Pack committees are beginning to fill out with new parents and me, but I could use church members to fill out key positions: Committee Chair, Treasurer, and Secretary.

The Troop and Pack committees are two very different committees and require our dedication to maintain long-term continuing oversight and participation. By stepping into these positions, you would help lighten the burden on the Den Leaders and the Cub/Scoutmasters. These units are YOUR units because they use

Hebron's facilities, tax exemption, and are chartered to Hebron Presbyterian Church. I mean, how can you own something and not take responsibility for it? If you own a car, wouldn't you make the payments, maintain it, and make sure it's safe? It's the same

thing with these Scouting units. Scouts represent another form of Christian Education in which Hebron participates.

Aren't we trying to teach our children the Bible and Christian ways? The same thing for Scouts, only they use an outdoor approach to help develop character, citizenship, and conservation. I would hope that all of you, as the owners of these units, would want to insure that these messages get taught to ALL youth, not just the Scouts.

Perhaps Christian Education could adopt some of the programs that the Scouts have developed, including "Two-deep leadership" and "Youth Protection guidelines." I encourage anyone to sign up on the internet at [www.myscouting.org](http://www.myscouting.org) and set up an account (without the requisite registration number) and learn more about Youth Protection.

I've learned that giving your time and some of your resources to this organization strengthens you, because you are challenged by the activities and continue the lifelong educational process. No other person has the

experience and ability that you possess to influence or help boys and parents. Combined with other dedicated adults, you will learn how to be effective and to present your views. Isn't that what growing, learning and living are all about?

The Pack Committee supervises the Pack (boys from grades 1 through 5) and handles the bill-paying, the recruiting and hiring of adult leaders, and the planning of the program. It sets policy for conducting Den and Pack meetings, and for what will be taught at these meetings. Don't worry that you won't know how to fit in. The desire to learn from BSA publications, on-line training through MyScouting.org, and other experienced scouts really makes this easier than when you started your first job just out of college. You listen a lot, but you do a lot toward achieving the purposes of Cub Scouting through KISMIF: Keep It Simple, Make It Fun.

The Troop Committee has other responsibilities in a Scout-led Troop (boys from 10 to 18). It has oversight, but planning is done *along with* the boys. It does more support functions such as forming Courts of Honor, Boards of Review, Fund Raising, and Ceremonies. It is more of an advisory/support function. Here the goal is to encourage the boys toward Eagle Scout Rank. The Valley District provides resources to help you with the Eagle Planning process.

I would welcome your participation in Scouting, with our Troop or Pack or both! There is always something you could do for our units as well as other units, such as being a Merit Badge Counselor on one of the 120 different merit badges, or, in Cub Scouting, belt loops. I want you to work with me in making Scouting inclusive of our Christian Education Program, not a separate program. This is already an "outreach" program

Hebron has a new Minister of Music effective Jan. 1, 2011 – Ben Heizer of Middlebrook.

A native of Middlebrook, Ben is currently a graduate student at Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, where he is pursuing the Master of Music degree in Church Music (concentrations in organ and choral conducting). He holds the Bachelor of Arts degree in Church Music from Bridgewater College (double emphasis in organ and voice, and special concentration in music composition).

In addition to serving as the Minister of Music and Organist at Hebron Presbyterian, he is also serving simultaneously as the organist at Bethany Lutheran Church in Waynesboro. Previously, he served from 2007-2010 as the Minister of Music and Organist at Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church in Staunton, and as Interim Organist at Muhlenberg Lutheran Church in Harrisonburg during the summer of 2007. Prior to 2007, he filled the role of a substitute organist/accompanist. While still a student at Riverheads High School, he studied part time for college credits at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville and Mary Baldwin College in Staunton.

He devotedly works to cultivate his skill at composing. His arrangements for solo organ and works for a *cappella* choir have been performed (or are scheduled to be performed in the near future) at churches in Staunton/Augusta County, Annandale, Charlottesville, Harrisonburg, Leesburg, Upperville, Waynesboro, and Winchester, VA.

Ben is a member of several professional organizations, including the American Guild of Organists, the Organ Historical Society, and the Hymn Society of America. In his spare time, he enjoys composing, woodworking, showing American Saddlebred show horses with his family, and regularly works to update the archives of the Organ Historical Society's National Register of Pipe Organs.

He firmly believes that music should be easily accessible to *everyone* and that all music should be "performed" for the Glory of God alone (*Soli Deo Gloria*).

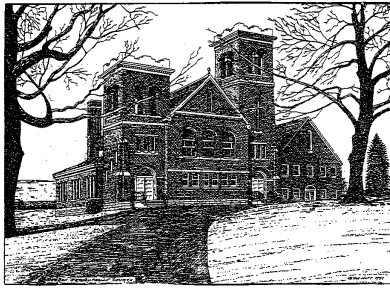

## History Behind the Radiator: Interesting Discoveries

Hebron's story is found in many interesting and unusual places. Recently, in an effort to improve the heating in Maxine Carpenter's Sunday school class, Emerson Willard worked on the radiator.

He uncovered some items left behind by our young people of the 1960s. First, were some items you might expect – chewing gum wrappers indicated that Juicy Fruit was the preferred choice. Also found were bulletins from 1964, 1965, and 1968. Pencils carried the names of *Staunton Union Stock Yard* and *Augusta Farm Bureau*, and a pen was from *Showalter Music Company*.

Projects left behind included a sun catcher showing the Christian cross as the center of the world. A promotional booklet from Massanetta Springs emphasized year-round programs.

Two student handwritten index cards proclaimed a message worth sharing: *The amazing truth about Jesus is that He is the Son of God. He is the perfect example of truth. He is the one who saves us from our sins and who gives meaning and direction to every area of our lives. Jesus taught many amazing truths about what He*

*had in mind for people to be and do, but all of those teachings would have been just those of another good man if Jesus were not God's Son and our Savior and Lord: "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."* ~ Author Unknown

Take a look at the names from the class book.
