

The Last Quarter of the Year Is Always Busy!

It seems like Christmas comes earlier and earlier. Don't we all go through this every year? This year, I saw my first special issue of a magazine for Christmas in *August!*

Certainly the end of the year seems to collapse upon itself, crowding more and more activities into less and less time. (Unless, of course, you're a child in school, when the days before holidays seem to drag on forever!)

Special worship services, special offerings, and special events abound from October through December.

Here at Hebron, we will celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper three times in the last three months of the year – World Communion Sunday Oct. 3, Christ the King Sunday Nov. 21, and Christmas Eve at our 10:00 p.m. service.

Mission events will include the CROP Walk in October, Operation Christmas Child (or the "Shoebbox Project") in November, and ringing bells for the Salvation Army in December.

Special fellowship events will include our covered-dish luncheon on Heritage Sunday, Oct. 10, and our covered-dish fellowship supper (or the Sunday School fellowship supper/Christmas Party) in December.

Activities at worship will include a congregational meeting will be held Oct. 17 to elect new elders, observance of Reformation Sunday Oct. 31, the Community Thanksgiving Service Nov. 24 (details to follow, but if the past calendar continues, the service will be held at Smoky Row Baptist Church, and Pastor Frank will preach the sermon), the observance of Advent for four consecutive Sundays beginning Nov. 28, and an afternoon and an evening Christmas Eve service.

Minutes For Regular Session Meeting Held August 19

The Session of Hebron Presbyterian Church held its stated monthly meeting on Thursday, Aug. 19, at 7:00 p.m. Minutes of the meeting were approved at the Sept. 16 Session meeting and are printed here:

A quorum being present, the Moderator opened the meeting at 7:01 p.m. with prayer, followed by a devotional based on Matthew 5:43-48 from the Sermon on the Mount.

Clerk's Report: Session approved the minutes of the July 1, 2010, Stated Session Meeting as presented. Session approved a motion to move Betty G. Piner back onto the active roll. Session approved a request from Reba Edwards to transfer to Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church in Blacksburg, VA.

Shenandoah Presbytery Meeting: Elder Alan Mayer will be elder-commissioner at the Aug. 21, 2010, Presbytery meeting in Franklin, WV.

Old Business: None

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Michael Ruleman distributed a report of fund balances as of Aug. 19, 2010, and a report of receipts and disbursements since the last meeting. There were no unusual expenses noted. The General Fund stands at (- \$492.83) which is an improvement of \$2,054.90 since the last report. Session received and approved the report.

Committee Reports:

Property (Glenn Mader, Tom Cook, Fred Smiley): Session approved a committee recommendation to contract with Steve and Lisa Beechers for a five-part repair project involving preparatory work, painting, and window re-glazing at the Church, Scout Hut, and Manse, at a cost will be \$9,545. The Treasurer will draw on available undesignated funds to pay for this project. Session approved the receipt of a gift of two brass light fixtures from Frank and Margaret Henderson and agreed to pay for their restoration and installation. These fixtures will be mounted over the two front doors to the sanctuary and will be done when the Beechers have a lift here to do the painting project.

Stewardship/Finance/Memorials (Frank Henderson, Alan Mayer, Theresa Moore): No report.

Worship (Jan Botkin, Hannah Bush, Lorrie Dean): The committee is discussing an outdoor worship ser-



vice. More details will be forthcoming. A regular worship service is planned for Heritage Sunday on Oct. 10, 2010, and the committee is working on plans for Advent and Christmas Eve worship services.

Cemetery (Alan Mayer, Jan Botkin): Chair Alan Mayer reported on the burial of Carl Trayer, Jr., on July 9, 2010, and Deborah Trayer on Aug. 12, 2010.

Christian Education (Lora Turnage, Hannah Bush): The committee distributed a report of its Aug. 15, 2010, meeting. Session approved the committee recommendation to use the *Uniform Adult Bible Study Series* by Smyth & Helways Publishing for the Adult Sunday School Class. Session approved the use of *Mayberry Comes to Church* video and discussion series for use in the Junior/Senior High Sunday School Class. Session approved Sunday School Teachers for 2010-2011 (all previously approved) and authorized the Commissioning of Sunday School Teachers during morning worship on Sunday, Sept. 12, 2010. The committee has met to discuss the guidelines for the Scott Hickey Memorial Fund; they have made some changes to the guidelines and will present them to the Hickey family.

Commitment/Witness (Martha Sieck): Chair Martha Sieck distributed a report of the Aug. 16, 2010, committee meeting. The report highlighted both current and planned activities. Of special note was the Sept. 11, 2010, Big Tent Event at Massanetta Springs Conference Center coordinated by Shenandoah Presbytery and the Presbyterian Women of Shenandoah Presbytery.

Congregational Ministries (Fred Smiley, Jon Arneson, Glenn Mader): Chair Fred Smiley reported that the committee is continuing with various activities. The new church picture directory has been completed and distributed to families, and the committee is discussing a Hebron History CD.

Fellowship/Service (Joan Wright): No report.

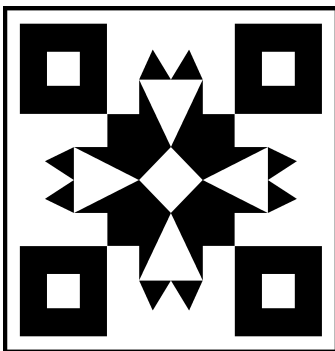

ances of Halloween, Thanksgiving (and the Black Friday beginning of the Christmas shopping rush the next day), Christmas and New Year's Eve.

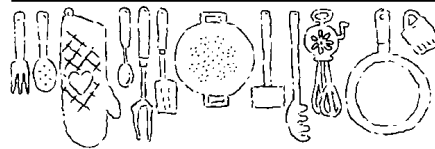
With so much going on, is it any wonder so many people feel overwhelmed at the end of the year, or become super-stressed during the holidays?

News from Aug. 21 Presbytery Meeting

Highlights of August 21, 2010, Meeting of Shenandoah Presbytery at Franklin Presbyterian Church, Franklin, WV.

Actions of Shenandoah Presbytery:

- Increased amount required for cash reserves from \$50,000 to \$200,000 in Standing Rules;
- Elected Larry Mayer (Hebron) to class of 2011 on Nominating Committee;
- Approved 2010 Terms of Call for Installed Pastors;
- Approved the report of the review of 2009 session minutes;

Postponed action until November meeting on a request for a Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP) Loan for Shepherdstown.

Reports and information shared from:

GA Commissioners and YAAD: written and oral reports;

Council: a task group will be planning how the Presbytery will prepare for and vote on actions from the 219th meeting of the General Assembly; and another group named to examine the future possibility of reducing costs in providing Presbytery offices and in meeting expenses;

Budget & Finance: received record of congregational giving through June, 2010, and the 2011 Preliminary Budget; concern was expressed regarding the weak economy and as a result B&F is committed to use up to \$50,000 from reserves for the 2010 and 2011 budgets;

Committee on Ministry: The committee recommended, "recognizing the ongoing economic conditions within our country, the COM urges churches to strive to provide a 2% compensation increase for their pastor(s) for 2011 for the stability of their ministry." Other actions taken: Approved CIF for Associate Pastor, 1st Waynesboro, and for Burnt to elect a PNC; transferred Susannah Tulloch to Presbytery of New Castle and James (Bill) Moore to Presbytery of Eastern Virginia; dissolved pastoral relationship between Jan Owen with Buffalo Gap and Craigsville (Frank Wyche is interim moderator for the sessions of these two churches), and Lee McDermott with Buckton; approved CLP Contracts for Ray Fitzgerald and Larry Miles for Parish of Shenandoah; approved Stated Supply contract for Bobby Spurgeon for Parish of the Pastures, Temporary Supply contract for Betty Jean Young for New Providence, and Interim Contract for Jan Owen for Tinkling Spring; gave permission to labor inside the bounds for Rev. Fritz Desire; received triennial visit reports; appointed PNC liaisons for Mt. Olive, Buffalo Gap and Craigsville and CLP mentors for Judy Hensley and Isca Mitchell; added Marcia Jaureguizar and Lee McDermott to the Pulpit Supply List.

World Wide Ministries: The committee met with Hunter Farrell on staff in Louisville, KY; the *Catch the Mission Spirit* and *Mission Crossroads* booklets were highlighted, plus a reminder of the \$2.00 per member giving to support missionaries

Committee on Preparation for Ministry: Shawn Hevener has been assessed ready to receive a call; recommend Becca Siddle move to candidacy (she will come before Presbytery at a later date); and request for prayers for four individuals taking ordination exams

Church Development Committee: A Task Force appointed to dispose of the property for Stone's Chapel has begun working, and the sale of a portion of the Kearneysville property to the WV Department of Transportation is being reviewed.

Presbyterian Campus Ministry is gathering names of Presbyterian students attending JMU, Bridgewater and Blue Ridge; developing the Wednesday night programs, worship and meals; and is planning for Collegiate Conference at Montreat following Christmas and an alternative spring break trip to Nashville, TN.

The next stated meeting of Presbytery is Nov. 9 at Massanetta Springs Conference Center.

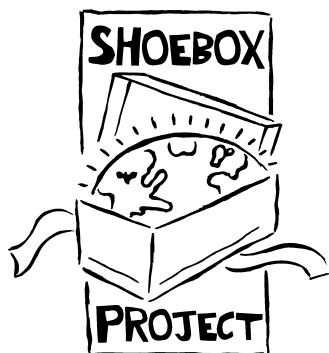

Hebron Again Supporting 'Operation Christmas Child'

Hebron will once again participate in "Operation Christmas Child," often known as "The Shoebox Project." This year, the Sisters in Christ Circle will be assisted by the Hebron Youth Group in packing shoeboxes for delivery to needy children around the world.

The Commitment/Witness Committee decided that the church will once again provide the boxes, and members are asked to give the contents, or to make financial gifts to buy materials and/or pay for postage.

Now is the time to shop for a child by filling a shoe box with appropriate items listed in the green brochure which is included with the shoebox. The brochure and regular or plastic shoeboxes are available in the Session Room and vestibules.



Use the instructions in the flyer on what types of gifts are needed (see list later in this article), and how to label the box for a boy or girl, and the appropriate age category.

National collection week for this project is Nov. 15-22, so we are asking that any shoeboxes given by Hebron be returned to the church by Sunday, Nov. 14. You can bring your filled shoebox to the church office anytime, or bring it to church and put it on the floor by the Communion Table on any Sunday morning.

The cost of mailing a shoebox is \$7 again this year. If money is not given for mailing, the church will cover the costs as mission giving. If you wish to pay for your own box or for others, or if you wish to give so that the church can buy more materials to go into gift boxes, please write a check payable to Hebron Presbyterian Church with "Operation Christmas Child" or "Shoebox Project" on the memo line, or you may put cash in the collection plate. If you give cash, please do not use your regular offering envelope; put it in a different envelope, or attach a note so that the church treasurer will know that the money goes to this mission project.

GIFT SUGGESTIONS

TOYS: small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoes, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch®, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky®, etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES: pens, pencils and sharpener, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring books, picture books, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS: toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

OTHER: sunglasses, socks, flashlights (with extra batteries), lollipops, hard candy, mints, gum (please double-bag all candy), ball caps, T-shirts, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches.



A PERSONAL

NOTE: In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. (If you include your name and address, the child may write back.)

DO NOT INCLUDE: used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; chocolate or food; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snowglobes or glass containers; aerosol cans.

Thank you for sharing in bringing joy to children around the world this Christmas.

CROP Walk Will Be Oct. 31

The CROP Hunger Walk – ending hunger one step at a time – will be Sunday, Oct. 31, and, as usual Hebron will participate.

If you are unable to give your contribution to a walker, you may give it or mail it to the Hebron treasurer, Mike Ruleman. Be sure to note that your donation is for the CROP Walk.

Some 2,000 communities across the country take part each year including different ages, faiths and backgrounds. Why walk? Hungry people in developing countries typically walk as much as six miles a day to get food, water and fuel. CROP Hunger Walks help fight hunger and poverty locally (25% of money raised in this area is given to SACRA) and globally. One out of every seven people in the world is hungry. Each day 16,000 children die from hunger-related causes – one every five seconds. More details later in the bulletin.

Just \$72 can provide emergency food supplies for a family of five's needs for a month.

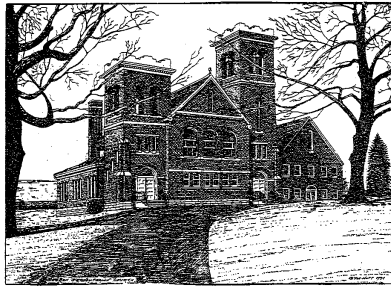

World Communion Sunday is also the day we receive the annual Peacemaking Offering of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Twenty-five percent (25%) of the offering stays with Hebron for local mission work, such as SACRA, Valley Mission, New Directions, etc. The rest goes to Shenandoah Presbytery and the denomination for other missions regionally, nationally and internationally.

You may use the Peacemaking Offering envelopes provided, or you can write on your regular envelope or your check memo line that you wish all or a portion of your gift to go to Peacemaking. Thank you for participating in this outreach of the Commitment/Witness Committee.

World Communion Sunday began in the Presbyterian Church in 1936, with Presbyterian churches throughout the United States and the world all observing the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the same Sunday.

For many years it was called "Worldwide Communion Sunday." In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches (a forerunner of the National Council of Churches, of which the PC(USA) is a member) adopted the observance, and commended it to the many Christian denominations throughout the U.S. and the world.

Today World Communion Sunday is observed on the first Sunday of October, serving as a tangible as well as a symbolic reminder that all Christians are members of the one Church, the body of Christ in the world.
