Minutes For Regular Session Meeting Held August 25

The Session of Hebron Presbyterian Church held its stated monthly meeting on Thursday, Aug. 25, at 7:00 p.m. Minutes of the meeting were approved at the Sept. 22 Session meeting and are printed here:

Present: Elders Hannah Bush, Richard Rathburn, Jim McGavock, David Obenschain, Lorrie Dean, Theresa Moore, Tom Cook, Martha Sieck, Lora Turnage, Jan Botkin, Joann Weikert, and Clerk Alan Mayer; Moderator Rev. Frank Wyche; Treasurer Michael Ruleman.

Excused: Frank Henderson, Robin Moyer, Eric Shiflet.

The Moderator opened the meeting with prayer at 7:00 p.m. A quorum was declared present. As the devotion, the Moderator used a reading from Daily Guideposts about the value of volunteering, with Ecclesiastes, Chapter 9, verse 10, as a reference.

Clerk's Report: Session approved the minutes of the July 28, 2011, Stated Session Meeting as presented. Session voted to remove Cornelia Riley Crosby from the church rolls following her death. Session approved the use of the kitchen and fellowship hall on Thursday, November 24, 2011, by the Lines family. Session received information regarding the presbytery's "Big Event," including a schedule of the workshops to be offered and registration details. Session was given documentation regarding decisions that congregations and sessions need to make in the near future because of the denomination's New Form of Government.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Michael Ruleman presented a detailed Report of Fund Balances as of August 25, 2011, and a Report of Receipts and Disbursements since the last meeting. The general fund stands at (-\$8,697.82) which is worse than the previous month. The total in our checking and savings stands at \$57,388.55. The Treasurer also distributed a Budget vs. Actual report which shows year-to-date actual income and expenses and what we budgeted for these accounts. Session approved the report.

Committee Reports

Property (Richard Rathburn, Tom Cook, Frank Henderson, James McGavock, David Obenschain): The committee is looking at the removal of three large trees in the front of the church.

Personnel (Tom Cook, Theresa Moore, Hannah Bush): The committee distributed a proposed job description for the pastor for evaluation purposes. Each elder is requested to make comments about the job description in the spaces provided, and to return the form to the committee by Sept. 11, 2011. Once approved by session, this job description will be used for the pastor's annual evaluation or performance review.



Finance (Theresa Moore, Larry Mayer): The committee will meet in September to begin work on the 2012 church budget.

Worship Committee (Jan Botkin, Hannah Bush, Joann Weikert): No report.

Cemetery (Larry Mayer, Jan Botkin): No report.

Commitment/Witness (Martha Sieck, David Obenschain): Activities include the following: Tools and Blankets project (disaster relief); Valley Mission baskets; SACRA; Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts; Missionary communications with Mark Hare in Haiti; *The Big Event* will have information on missions.

Christian Education (Lora Turnage, Eric Shiflet): Sunday School kick-off breakfast will be Sept. 11, 2011, at 9:00 a.m. All four Hebron youths who applied for Presbytery Scholarships received them.

Congregational Ministries (Lorrie Dean, Martha Sieck): Work continues with home-bound members.

Fellowship (Lorrie Dean, Robin Moyer): Homecoming activities will include the PW annual memorial service, a dessert dinner, and an afternoon concert by Minister of Music Ben Heizer.

Pastor's Report: The next round of home communion will begin soon. Work on the next newsletter is under way. The Pastor has been out of the office more than usual lately because of visiting our folks in the hospital. The Pastor continues to serve as moderator of the Buffalo Gap and Craigsville churches at the request of Presbytery.

New Business: Session decided the dates for the November and December Stated Session meetings will be November 17, 2011, and December 15, 2011.

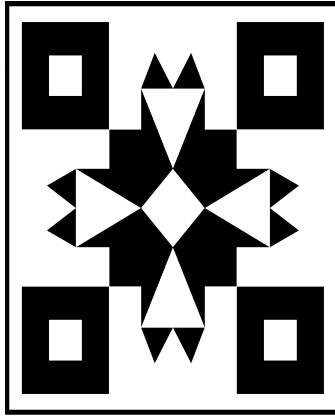
The next stated Session meeting will be Sept. 22, 2011, 7:00 p.m.

Stewardship Report

From the Hebron Session's
Stewardship and Finance Committee

This is the second in the series of articles providing you, Hebron's members and friends, with important financial information about our church.

Last month we explained the current problem of our income (offerings) not being enough to sustain the day-to-day operation of the church. We are being forced to rely on savings to meet expenses. We explained that expenses are being kept to the bare minimum and income must increase. A

chart is in the weekly Sunday bulletin listing the four previous weeks' offerings.

This month we will look at where our current income comes from. Sunday worship attendance is averaging about 116 per

week. We average about 32 regular individual offerings per week and have approximately 10 regular monthly contributors. We have members in the church who do not contribute regularly. We also have non-members who **both attend and** contribute regularly.

In order to meet our *budgeted* expenses, we need to average about \$3,622 per weekly offering. Using these numbers, each weekly regular contributor needs to average about \$86 per week and each monthly contributor needs to average about \$344 per month to meet our budget. Using our current year-to-date weekly average of \$2,999, our weekly contributors are **averaging** \$71 per week each and our monthly contributors are **averaging** \$284 per month each. **Where does your weekly or monthly contribution fit in the above averages?**

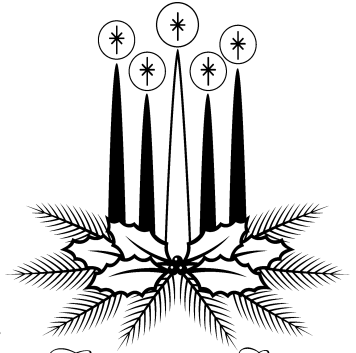
Remember, these are averages; some give considerably more and others give considerably less.

We know that times are tough right now. The economy is not good. People are losing jobs, food prices are up, gas prices fluctuate wildly for no apparent reason, and the stock market is a roller-coaster ride. Even though our government says the recession ended in August 2009, we all know better. Some wonder where the next dollar will come from. Many have not received a raise or cost of living increase in years.

Not a very pretty picture, is it? But let's look at a few things particular to Hebron. Most of our members are older and more financially established. Most of us have the same job and/or income stream we've had for years. While we're aware of the financial uncertainty, most of us haven't felt the full crunch that many younger fami-

lies have had to deal with, or that other churches have to deal with because they're still paying off mortgages on property and/or buildings. This is greatly appreciated and helps the church in its budgeting and planning process. We shouldn't treat church as we would a play or movie, only buying a ticket (making an offering) if we attend. The church needs your regular contributions to succeed and prosper. If you are a regular contributor to Hebron Presbyterian Church, you already know what you contribute to the church. Compare your offerings to the numbers above. Where do you fit in? If you're not a regular contributor, please consider becoming one. We ask everyone to prayerfully consider increasing your offerings to God's Church. We thank everyone for their continued support.

Next month, we'll look at why we should give.

Remember: everything in the world belongs to God; we're just stewards of it.

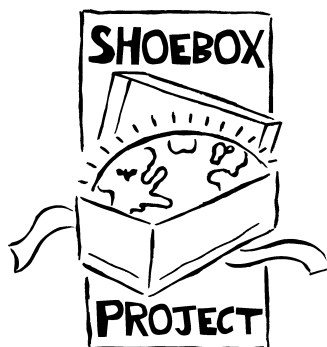

Hebron Again Supporting 'Operation Christmas Child'

Hebron will once again participate in "Operation Christmas Child," often known as "The Shoebox Project."

The Commitment/Witness Committee decided that the church will once again provide the boxes, and members are asked to give the contents, or to make financial gifts to buy materials and/or pay for postage.

Now is the time to shop for a child by filling a shoe box with appropriate items. Appropriate items are listed in this article, and also in the green brochure which will be included with the shoebox the church will provide. After they are acquired, the brochure and regular



or plastic shoeboxes will be available in the Session Room and vestibules.

Use the instructions in the flyer on what types of gifts are needed (see list later in this article), and how to label the box for a boy or girl, and the appropriate age category.

National collection week for this project is Nov. 14-21, so we are asking that any shoeboxes given by Hebron be returned to the church by Sunday, Nov. 20. You can bring your filled shoebox to the church office anytime, or bring it to church and put it on the floor by the Communion Table on any Sunday morning.

The cost of mailing a shoebox is \$7 again this year. If money is not given for mailing, the church will cover the costs as mission giving. If you wish to pay for your own box or for others, or if you wish to give so that the church can buy more materials to go into gift boxes, please write a check payable to Hebron Presbyterian Church with "Operation Christmas Child" or "Shoebox Project" on the memo line, or you may put cash in the collection plate. If you give cash, please do not use your regular offering envelope; put it in a different envelope, or attach a note so that the church treasurer will know that the money goes to this mission project.

GIFT SUGGESTIONS

TOYS: small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoes, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch A Sketch®, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky®, etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES: pens, pencils and sharpener, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring books, picture books, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS: toothbrush, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

OTHER: sunglasses, socks, flashlights (with extra batteries), lollipops, hard candy, mints, gum (please double-bag all candy), ball caps, T-shirts, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches.

NOTE: In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family. (If you include your name and address, the child may write back.)

DO NOT INCLUDE: used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; chocolate or food; out-of-date candy, liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snowglobes or glass containers; aerosol cans.

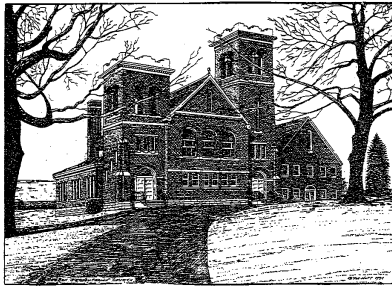

World Communion Sunday and Peacemaking Offering Oct. 2

Hebron will participate in World Communion Sunday on Sunday, Oct. 2, joining churches of different denominations throughout the world in celebrating the Lord's Supper.

World Communion Sunday is also the day we receive the annual Peacemaking Offering of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Twenty-five percent of the offering stays with Hebron for local distribution. The Commitment/Witness Committee has designated missionary Mark Hare in Haiti as the recipient of the 25% to be dispersed at our discretion. The rest goes to Shenandoah Presbytery and the PC(USA) for regional, national and international mission projects.

Contributions will be accepted throughout the month. You may use the Peacemaking Offering envelopes provided, or you can write on your regular envelope or your check memo line that you wish all or a portion of your gift to go to Peacemaking. Thank you for participating in this outreach of the Commitment/Witness Committee.

World Communion Sunday began in the Presbyterian Church in 1936, with Presbyterian churches throughout the United States and the world all observing the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the same Sunday.

For many years it was called "Worldwide Communion Sunday." In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches (a forerunner of the National Council of Churches, of which the PC(USA) is a member) adopted the observance, and commended it to the many Christian denominations throughout the U.S. and the world.

Today World Communion Sunday is observed on the first Sunday of October, serving as both a tangible and a symbolic reminder that all Christians are members of the one Church, the body of Christ in the world.
