

## An Update on Hebron Finances and Stewardship

### From the Stewardship and Finance Committee of the Session at Hebron

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! We hope this finds you well as we come to the end of a long, hot summer. Our children have started back to school. Our young adults have headed off to college or entered the work force and we all begin to ready ourselves for cooler weather.

The fall is always the beginning of the budgeting/planning/stewardship period of the church and this year is no different. Several years ago, the Stewardship and Finance Committee provided a series of newsletter articles to discuss and explain the financial situation of the church. The committee feels that now is a great time, once again, to let you know where we are and where we're headed. Over the next several months, we will provide you with much information, through newsletter articles, about the financial health of Hebron Presbyterian Church.

Hebron's members and contributors have always been extremely generous. Give them a project to contribute to and they will support it. For example, since 1999, Hebron has raised and spent over \$700,000 on the New Century Fund, the Taylor/Boody organ purchase, sanctuary remodeling, manse window project and others. That amount was over and above the regular contributions to fund the day-to-day operations of the church and to fulfill our benevolent obligations. For a small, country church in Swoope, Virginia, this is amazing; we should all be very proud, but we cannot rest on pride alone.

Over the last few years, a disturbing trend has begun. We are spending more money on the day-to-day operation of the church than we are taking in. We have been forced to rely on savings to supplement the weekly offerings. This cannot continue. Hebron Presbyterian Church has long been in a unique and enviable savings

financial position: **We have no debt.** Many of the newer churches in the area have large mortgages on their new or remodeled facilities. Some of these churches have monthly loan payments of \$10,000 to \$15,000. Fortunately, we owe nothing. Everything Hebron has is fully paid for. Not many churches, organizations, businesses or individuals can say that. The flip side of the equation is that we do not have a large sur-

# Minutes For Regular Session Meeting Held June 23

The Session of Hebron Presbyterian Church held its stated monthly meeting on Thursday, June 23, at 7:00 p.m. Minutes of the meeting were approved at the July 28 Session meeting and are printed here:

**Present:** Elders David Obenschain, Frank Henderson, Hannah Bush, Lorrie Dean, Richard Rathburn, Jim McGavock, Lora Turnage, Martha Sieck, Tom Cook, Theresa Moore, Robin Moyer, Jan Botkin, Joann Weikert, Clerk Alan Mayer; Moderator Rev. Frank Wyche; and Treasurer Michael Ruleman. Absent: Eric Shiflet. Guest: Bill Glover.

The Moderator opened the meeting with prayer at 7:00 p.m. A quorum was declared present.

The Moderator recognized Bill Glover, who had asked to be on the agenda to make comments. Bill went through a series of questions he had prepared. The main theme in all he said was that the Pastor does not do enough visiting to those who are sick, on the prayer list, or when there has been a death in the family; and that the Session was not practicing adequate oversight. A long discussion followed in which the Pastor responded to various examples of the allegations. The Pastor did acknowledge and apologize again for not having visited Bill's grandson, when he had meant to do it; and he informed Session he had already apologized to Bill previously. He also pointed out that hospitals do not inform churches when someone is in the hospital, so if the family doesn't notify the pastor or the church office, the pastor does not know that someone has been to the hospital. Session directed some of these concerns to Session committees to be answered, particularly the Congregational Care Committee. In addition, Session made it clear to Bill that his decision to voice his concerns during a previous Sunday worship service was not acceptable. It was a complete disruption of worship, and a distraction to all those members and guests who had come to worship God on Pentecost Sunday, and to all those who participate in worship planning. The church office is open during the week and the pastor keeps regular office hours during which time issues and complaints can be addressed with him directly.

**Clerk's Report:** Session approved the minutes of the May 26, 2011, Stated Session Meeting as presented. The Clerk presented a thank-you letter from the General Assembly Mission Council for our contributions of \$5,350 in 2010 and year-to-date 2011.

**Treasurer's Report:** Treasurer Michael Ruleman presented a detailed Report of Fund Balances as of June 23, 2011, and a Report of Receipts and Disbursements since the last meeting. The general fund has improved to (-\$4,993.04) from (-\$5,524.77) in the previ-



ous month. The total in our checking and savings was \$53,791.04. The Treasurer agreed to a suggestion that he start giving Session monthly reports on year-to-date actual expenses versus budget in each of the budget categories. Session approved the report as presented.

**Presbytery Matters:** Session approved the Shenandoah Presbytery Scholarship applications submitted by four of our young college and college-bound students. They are Katie Botkin, Martha Moore, Sean Ratliff, and Andrew Wyche.

After the Moderator very briefly reviewed the New Form of Government (nFOG) which has been adopted by our denomination, Session approved the use of the current *Book of Order* (as amended) for use at Hebron. The approved motion reads: "The Session of Hebron Presbyterian Church approves the 2009-2011 Form of Government, as amended, of the Presbyterian Church (USA) *Book of Order* as its transitional manual, effective July 10, 2011." The 2009 -2011 *Book of Order* will be our operations manual until the new Form of Government can be studied and a local version adopted for Hebron.



Fellowship (Lorrie Dean, Robin Moyer): Plans are under way for Homecoming.

The latest round of Home Communion will begin when the Pastor returns from vacation. plus of funds to fall back on. We are like the family that lives week to week, paycheck to paycheck. That's fine as long as the income can cover the expenses but creates a huge problem when the income goes down and/or the expenses go up. That's what is happening now. Monthly expenses are exceeding income by an increasingly alarming amount. This cannot continue or church services and programs will have to be cut. None of us want this.

Now, the first response by many to the above news is to say "That's simple – just cut expenses." Unfortunately, it's *not* that simple. The Hebron expense budget reflects the bare minimum necessary to maintain the church's services at the current level. No programs have been cut from the budget, but nothing new has been added either. We'd like to think that now as we have completed all these costly projects that we could be adding new programs and further outreach into the community and world. We'd like to replace the saved

funds that we have used over the past several years and possibly put some away for "a rainy day." Our current level of contributions will not allow us to do this.

We now need to concentrate on giving more toward the operation (general expenses) of the church, and especially on our benevolent giving. The more money we can take in over and above that necessary to run the church, the more we can send to our local and worldwide benevolent causes – in other words, to do the work in this world that we are called to do.

We must remember, however, that in order to do that important work (benevolent giving); we must first have the vessel in which to do it. That vessel is the fully operational church. Without the church, we as a group of individuals cannot do what needs to be done. It is true that as individuals we can continue to do God's work, but as a collective group, we can do so much more.

Over the next few months, we will provide an outline of how we propose to do this. We ask that you prayerfully consider these new ideas.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by the moderator at 8.30 p.m.







## *Homecoming Weekend To Include PW ‘Celebration of Life’*

The theme for the 2011 Homecoming at Hebron Presbyterian Church will be “History Harvest” – a celebration of 265 years of history and fellowship at Hebron. Homecoming activities will be held on Saturday and Sunday, October 8 and 9, 2011. More details will be provided in future bulletins and newsletters.

Hebron’s “Celebration of Life” service, sponsored by the Presbyterian Women and formerly known as the annual Memorial Service, will be held on Saturday night, Oct. 8, as part of the Homecoming activities. The service is ordinarily held on the first Tuesday of September, but it will be part of Homecoming this year.

Saturday night will include a Dessert Dinner featuring homemade ice cream and pies, as well as a candle-lighting service as part of the Celebration of Life program, along with a booklet of remembrances of those in the Hebron family who have passed away within the past year.

As part of this project, the Homecoming Committee is working on updating Hebron’s history. We are asking you to delve into your closets, attics, photo albums

and anywhere else you may have stored treasures about Hebron. Items may be brought to the church during business hours.
